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

When Your Pet Vomits

As many of us know, vomiting isn't a pleasant experience. When your pet vomits there are several reasons to pay attention. Because your pet is unable to talk, it is up to you to figure out what just happened. You may ask yourself if they ate too quickly? Could they have a tummy ache? Were they chewing on your plants, yarn or thread? Is the baby's pacifier missing?

These are all valid questions. Yes, they can get a tummy bug or eat too fast. Some plants are poisonous, which can lead to tummy upset or worse. If you suspect your pet ingested something, we need to see him.

If your pet is not acting like he should, there is reason to be concerned. When vomiting is continuous, your pet can quickly become dehydrated. This can then lead to nausea which can cause them to vomit more.

If vomiting is intermittent, write it on the calendar. What is in the debris and how often is it happening? Contact our clinic to see if there is reason for concern.

If your pet is exhibiting more signs than just vomiting, further evaluation may be needed. Even if it is a tummy bug, we can help him feel better fast. Don't wait; no one likes a tummy ache.

What's your New Years Resolution?
